## **Basic Lifeguarding Assignment**

Information for the following questions can be found in the ALERT manual. Answers should detailed, and on a separate sheet of paper. Each question will be marked out of 6 for accuracy and completeness.

- 1. Explain both the "intensive" and "extensive" approaches to the observation of swimmers. List some of the advantages and disadvantages of each system.
- 2. List the different positions a lifeguard could assume (sitting, standing, raised chair, roving), and explain their significance. Include such things as advantages and disadvantages where applicable.
- 3. You are on lifeguard duty and have seen someone pushing another swimmer into the water. Explain in detail how you would handle this situation, supporting your answers with concrete reasons.
- 4. Explain what inservice training is, and describe a program that you might enjoy participating in. Then justify the expense of the inservice training program to a skeptical tax payer.
- 5. Emergencies can often be labeled as MAJOR or MINOR. State the differences between these two types of emergencies and list the general procedures used to deal with each type.
- 6. Mrs. Pat Jones, a hysterical mother, comes to you regarding her missing four year old boy. He is blond, wearing red trunks, is a non-swimmer and has not been located for 20 minutes. Design a procedure to adequately cope with the situation (eg. communication methods, search pattern, public relations, etc...).
- 7. One of the most important aspects of lifeguarding is to prevent accidents from happening. List 12 preventive measures that might be used to prevent accidents in your swimming area.
- 8. List at least six differences between the role and training of lifeguards and lifesavers.
